"It is easier for some to adapt to the new environment and learn about all the school has to offer than others. The ones that have a harder time adapting often miss out on all the school has to offer simply because they are nervous or unaware. They feel disconnected



from the other students and sometimes even the staff members because they feel as if they are labeled as the 'new kid."

Jessica knew it could be intimidating to ask for

help or guidance throughout adjusting to a new school. This is why Jessica created the Grayhound Ambassadors Club, an entrance program emphasizing relationship building, to provide transfer students the resources and knowledge to be successful.

Her entrance program will assist new students by taking their families on tours of the school, providing a packet with helpful information such as a school map, a list of school and community resources, a course catalog, and much more.

Fiscal years 2021 and 2020 were extraordinary years with COVID-19 restrictions impacting the council's regular programs. Summer camp was not open in FY20 and operated at half capacity in FY21. Council properties were also severely impacted in FY20 by multiple storms, including the 2020 derecho, which caused nearly \$2 million in damages.

Non-operating Gains/Losses include revenue from a PPP loan that was fully forgiven through a federal grant in FY21 (restated from FY20 as previously recorded), insurance recovery proceeds received in advance of repairs to properties, and adjustments to the value of assets impaired by the storms in FY20. Public Support for FY20 and FY21 includes an extraordinary legacy gift from friends of the council.
